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## Introduction

Figure 1 Area of Wiltshire

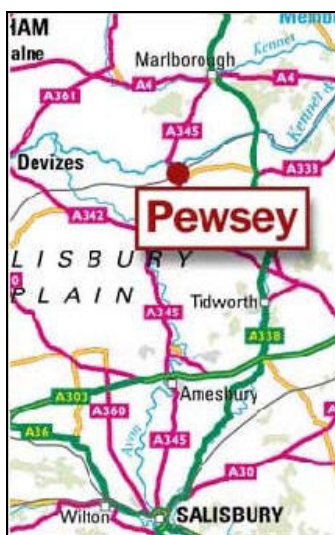


Figure 2 Pewsey

## Pewsey

Archaeological digs around the village indicate that there has been a settlement here since the 6th century, however it was the opening of the Kennet and Avon canal in 1810, and the railway in 1862 that transformed Pewsey into a bustling community. A quaint village that retains its charming character, Pewsey is a hotspot for crop circle enthusiasts.

The Pewsey vale is recognised as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and is extremely popular with the outdoor enthusiast.<sup>1</sup>

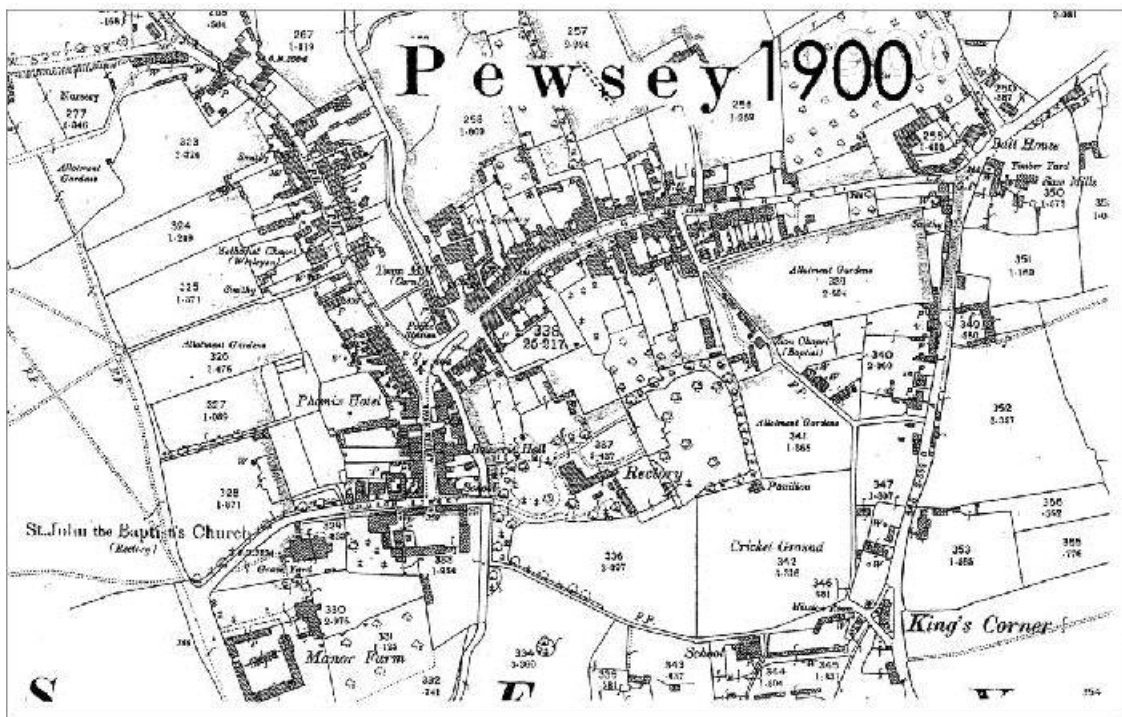


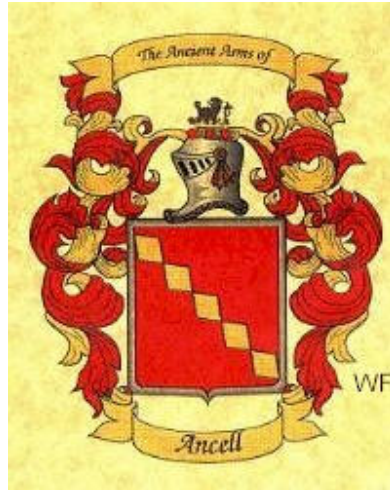
Figure 3 Pewsey 1900

King Alfred was crowned King of Wessex in 870 CE and owned much of the land in the Pewsey Vale. Legend has it that he went off to war and left his wife in the care of the people of Pewsey. Upon his safe return, he granted the inhabitants of Pewsey the right to an annual feast. This feast accounts for the Feaste Ball now held every other year, and has been incorporated into the modern day [Pewsey Carnival](#) - held for two weeks in September and originally designed to raise funds for Savernake Hospital.

Referred to as "Pevesie" in the Domesday Book<sup>o</sup> of 1086 CE, Pewsey was said to have had 46 villagers, 24 tenant farmers, 6 serfs and 7 mills.

## Ansell Surname Origins



For centuries, most people used only one name to identify themselves. As the population began increasing, the need for more identification also became increasingly apparent, especially in small towns, clans, and villages where perhaps 1/3 of the males were named James or some other popular name.

And so to distinguish one James from another, a second name was desired. The four main sources for these names were: 1) a man's occupation or trade, such as Cook, Tanner, or Hunter. 2) his father's name, Robertson, Jackson, or Davidson. 3) his locale, such as Jesus of "Nazareth," Thomas "Uphill," or William "Groves." 4) even his characteristics or looks might be used, i.e. James Legg, William Redman, or John Fox.

Sometimes extra identification was needed for certain groups. The fighting men of the Middle Ages were known to wear a metal suit of armor for protection. More than likely, this same suit of armor included a helmet that completely covered the head, making the warrior unrecognizable.

To prevent a friend from attacking his ally during battle, it became very important for each knight to somehow identify himself. Many fighters accomplished this by painting colorful designs on their shields.

These same designs were also sewn into cloth surcoats which were placed over a fighter's suit of armor, giving him his family crest or what is known as the "Coat of Arms." The Ancell's wore theirs into battles in which they engaged.

To prevent duplication of the patterns, records were kept that granted the privilege of wearing a certain crest to a particular fighter and this right was extended down to his family. Many times these patterns were recorded in ancient record books.

So where did the Ancell family name come from? Let's begin at the beginning. From all of the records on hand, it would appear that the Ancell family descended from the

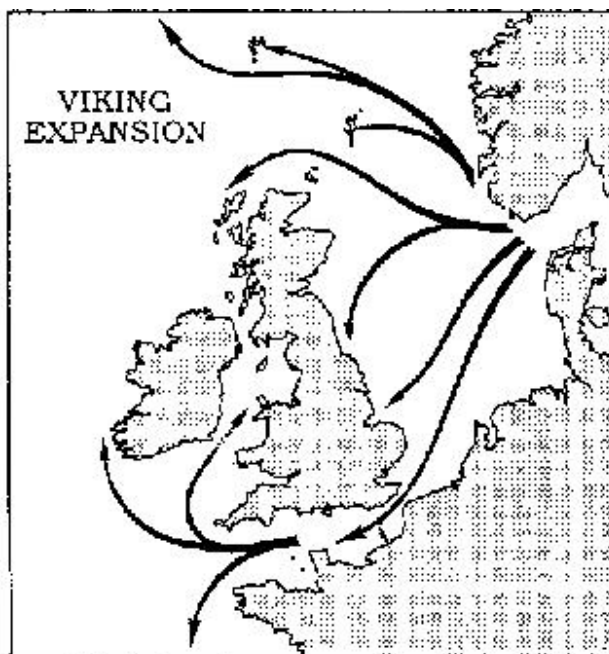

## **VIKINGS**

From the end of the eighth century until the eleventh, Vikings, the people of Norway, Denmark and Sweden, migrated from their homeland hungry for land and trade - and even a little piracy. Many settled in the northern isles, such as Faeroe, Orkney, Shetland and the Hebrides, also Ireland, the North East of England and the Isle of Man, but one of the most successful, and certainly best documented, of all Viking settlements was Iceland. Here, with no native population to subjugate - apart from a few Irish monks - their Norse Viking traditions could continue and flourish.

Iceland was divided and ruled by rich and powerful 'GODI', secular Priest and Chieftains. When a central authority was established at the end of the settlement period in AD930 the 'Althing', or General Assembly, with its legislative and judicial power was, not surprisingly, placed in the hands of the thirty-six 'GODAR'. This absolute power continued until the end of the Republic in c.1263. Another equally successful Viking settlement was made in northern France.

## **NORMANDY**

In Normandy, the predominantly Danish Vikings were soon assimilated and within three or four generations were almost completely 'Frenchified'. During this assimilation many Viking traditions will have been lost. One of the most obvious losses, through their Christianisation, will have been the priesthood of the 'GODAR', but this is not to say that the name or memory of this powerful group will have been lost. It is very likely that the name will have survived as a personal name. Indeed, to this day many Viking personal names survive with the French suffix of "ville" as a testament to their influence over this area, Godarville being but one. These new Viking power bases in turn became springboards for new waves of invasion and migration.

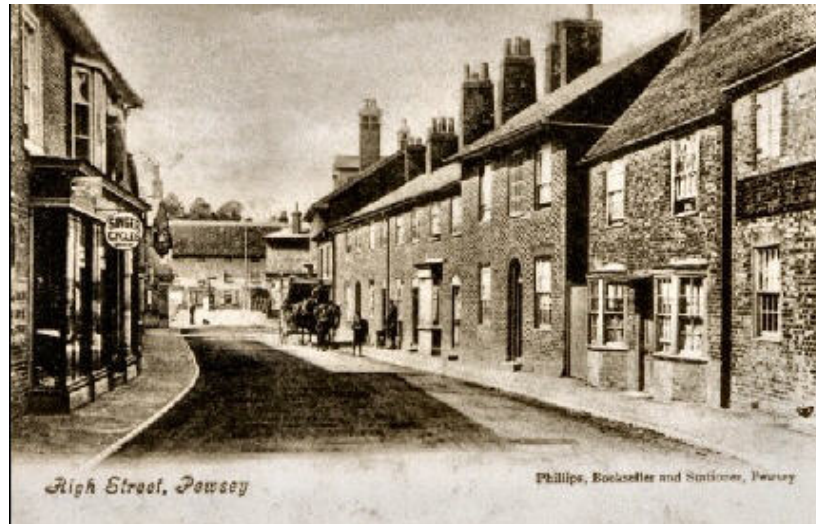
## **BRITISH GODDARDS**

One of the best known and perhaps most researched branches of the family to date, the North Wiltshire Goddards, can trace their descent from 1370 when they were given Upham House and Aldbourn Chase by John of Gaunt. But Goddards had been in the area before this as Walter de Godarville was appointed Castellan of Devizes Castle in 1231.

This branch of the family typifies what is thought of as the English landed gentry, marrying into many of the families on the fringes of court, and, sending their sons into the army, the church, parliament and the law. Not all Goddards of course had the benefit of Royal patronage, many were farmers and merchants, but most were probably simple peasants.



In the 1901 census the family are staying in the High Street, Pewsey, Wiltshire, England.
